What is human geography?


How human activity is influenced by the landscape.

How society is affected by the physical landscape.

Human geography looks at humans and their cultures, communities, economies and interactions with the environment by studying their relationships with different locations.

We are going to be thinking about the human geography of our local area, specifically how the physical features of our local area have influenced the **transport** that we use.



Did you think of any others? Although lots of these are available in nearby towns and cities, we don't find them in Macclesfield.

Now you have some ideas of what we do and don't have in our local area, go back to your mind map and add any you hadn't thought of.

Next, we're going to think about how where we are located in the country has affected the types of transport we have available in our area.

Here is a map of Macclesfield. The blue line is the canal and the red line is the train track.



You might notice that the train line and canal run north-south and you might be able to see a few main roads heading out west. Why do you think that is? Why do you think there is less transport running East? (hint: think about the **physical** geography of that area)

Think about the transport that we **do not** have in our local area. Can you think of any reasons that the **physical geography** of our area has meant it wasn't possible to have those things?

Extension task

Think about a typical week in your life (perhaps pre-lockdown might be more interesting!).

When you have finished, decide which mode of transport you use most frequently, e.g. walking, car or maybe the bus? Why do you think that is? What is the mode of transport that you use least frequently?
